

Susann G. Mark is a business attorney, having practiced both in private practice, as a partner in Tillinghast, Licht and Semonoff from 1988 until 1998 and as corporate counsel, first to Textron Inc. from 1978-1988 and then as Vice President and General Counsel of Providence Energy Corporation from 1999 until 2001, when the company was acquired by Southern Union Corporation. Prior to returning to private practice in 2007, Susann worked in development of affordable housing in Rhode Island, opening a partnership office for Fannie Mae in 2001 and later serving as Executive Director of Elmwood Foundation from 2004 until 2006.
